Why health?



- Top rural issue in national survey (RSN, 2017)
- Closure /centralisation of service outlets
- Political agenda at all levels
- Intrinsically linked to other issues
 - employment
 - housing
 - transport
 - deprivation
 - etc



Why health?

State of Rural Services Report (2017)

- The rural population is ageing, which will place extra demand on services like GP surgeries and adult social care.
- Rural areas score badly on certain Public Health Outcome indicators, mainly those related to service provision (e.g. health checks, screening access) or those on traditional rural concerns (e.g. isolation, road casualties).
- **Funding** for public health is much lower for rural than urban local authorities. Some rural areas get under £30 per resident. The England average is £51.
- Suicide rates are relatively high in rural areas and farmers have the highest rate among any occupation (because of their tendency not to seek help).
- Mental health services are more restricted in rural NHS Trust areas. Relative to their populations, rural areas have fewer doctors, nurses, social workers and therapists, with fewer home visits and inpatient facilities.
